After a mad evening arranging exhibitors' tables the day before with lots of other helpers, 44 of them arrived with marvellous contraptions of all shapes and sizes, fascinating displays and colourful flora and fauna in tow. Doors opened officially at 10am and a steady trickle, then a fair sized flow of the Great British Public came along to discover the delights of what the day had to offer including a reporter from the Eastern Daily Press. We recorded around 900 individuals coming though the main entrance, not accounting for ones who found their way in via other routes.

There was an exciting programme of wildlife walks, bug hunts and tours to see the college's collection of animals including snake handling, which could also be done on the Norfolk Amphibian and Reptile Group stand, where Rollo the Python made his second appearance. A mischief of field mice, a busyness of ferrets, a creep of tortoises, a parliament of owls and a soar of falcons (no, not exaggerating) made up a fantastic menagerie so that we could understand a bit more about these creatures and look out for them in the future.

We welcomed back the bird ringing group from the University of East Anglia where folk could see the amazing details of birds in the hand and learn why ringing is so important in finding out more about the habits of our local feathered friends so we can look after them better.
